Board/Commission/ Committee Leadership Development

History on Term Limits

- ▶ September 1991 - Ordinance No. 1640-9-91 was passed establishing two year term limits for all Boards/Commissions/Committees.
- ▶ July 2004 - Due to lack of applications being received for these volunteer positions, Ordinance 3088-07-2004 was approved by the City Council removing term limits for all Boards/Commissions/Committees.
- ▶ Members are now selected for two year terms. At the end of each of the term they are required to submit a new application form if they wish to be reappointed.
 - ▶ Typically all those requesting reappointment have been reappointed.
 - ▶ Once appointed to a board, members rarely seek appointment to a different board.

Reasons to Encourage Board Rotation

- ▶ Graduates of Citizen University are encouraged to apply for board appointments; after four (4) years nineteen (19) graduates are potential new board members. This number will grow as we move forward.
- ▶ Castle Hills annexation will bring in new residents that are potential board members.
- ▶ Board rotation allows City Council to strive to obtain diversity on each board.
- ▶ Rotation of board members allows for better development of community leaders and fresh board perspectives.

Education Process

- ▶ The City Secretary will coordinate an education process to encourage board rotation for reasons stated earlier.
- ▶ While no term limits exist for boards, City Council will give consideration to rotation or replacement of members who have completed in excess of three terms. Emphasis will be placed on taking such action when a number of applications have been received for a particular board.
- ▶ A board member will not be considered for rotation when City Council determines that:
 - 1) No applications to serve on the board in question that meet a specific requirement have been received
 - 2) Board membership requires specific expertise, experience or professional certifications and extended service by the member is beneficial to the board in question

Boards Exempted From Rotation Process

1. Charter Review Committee
 - ▶ New board appointed every five (5) years
2. Oil and Gas Advisory Board
 - ▶ Meets only on an as-needed basis; 3 out of 7 members must be from oil and gas industry
3. Lewisville 2025 Committee
 - ▶ Made up of original members involved in development of plan
4. Planning and Zoning Commission
 - ▶ Committee handles complex issues and also serves as Transportation Board and Capital Improvement Advisory Committee
5. Housing Finance Committee
 - ▶ Meets on an as-needed basis; last met in 2012

Boards Exempted From Rotation Process (continued)

6. Industrial Development Corporation

- ▶ Meets on an as-needed basis; last met over twenty (20) years ago

7. Parks & Library Development Corporation

- ▶ Made up of four (4) City Council members, Park Board Chair, Library Board Chair and Blue Ribbon Bond Committee Chair

8. Local Government Corporation

- ▶ Last met in 2010
