OCTOBER 7, 2025

Item A: Call to Order and Announce that a Quorum is Present

With a quorum present, the Lewisville Planning and Zoning Commission meeting was called to order by Chair Karen Locke at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, October 7, 2025, in the Council Chambers, of the Lewisville City Hall, 151 West Church Street, Lewisville, Texas.

Item B: Approval of Minutes

1. Consider the minutes of the September 16, 2025, Regular Meeting.

A motion was made by Jack Tidwell to approve the minutes as presented, seconded by Ainsley Stelling. The motion passed unanimously (6-0).

Item C: Public Hearing

2. Public Hearing: Consideration of a Zone Change From Light Industrial (LI) District and Specific Use (SU) District to Planned Development - Light Industrial (PD-LI) District, on 52.589 Acres Legally Described as First Broadcasting Addition, Block A, Lot 1 and Block B, Lot 1; Located on the East Side of Huffines Boulevard, Approximately 1,000 Feet West of Holfords Prairie Road on Both the North and South Sides of the Future Corporate Drive; as Requested by Pulley Studios, Inc., and Prologis the Applicant, on Behalf of Dallas Broadcasting LLC, the Property Owners. (25-04-3-PZ)

Jon Beckham, Senior Planner, gave a brief overview and staff's recommendation. The applicant was available for questions. Jose Marines with the Parks and Recreation Department was also available for questions. Staff stated maintenance details for the trail and natural areas are still pending a future agreement between the Parks Department and the applicant. Chair Locke opened the public hearing. The applicant, Robert Dawson with Halff Associates, addressed concerns about the protection of existing trees and vegetation during construction, confirming that standard protective measures (e.g., orange fencing) and a prior tree survey have been completed, particularly around the large culvert system necessary for the western drive of Tract 2. With no one else indicating a desire to speak, the public hearing was then closed. <u>A motion was made by Erum Ali to recommend approval of the zone change as presented, seconded by Joshua Peterson.</u> <u>The motion passed unanimously (6-0)</u>. Richard E. Luedke, Planning Director, stated that this item would be considered by the City Council on Monday, November 3, 2025, at 7:00 p.m. for a second public hearing and final decision.

Item D: Announcements

Richard E. Luedke, Planning Director, stated that several staff members are out participating in National Night Out which is being used for community engagement regarding the 2035 Plan and encouraged Commissioners to participate in their neighborhood.

Item E: Adjournment

A motion was made by Joshua Peterson to adjourn the Planning and Zoning Commission meeting. The motion was seconded by Jack Tidwell. The motion passed unanimously (6-0). There being no other business to discuss, the Planning and Zoning Commission meeting was adjourned at 6:45 p.m.

BACKGROUND:

DATE:

Kwik Kar, the applicant, is a car repair company that provides minor automotive repair services such as oil changes, state inspections, and tune ups. The applicant plans to occupy the existing automotive repair and carwash buildings at 1111 West Round Grove Road. The supplemental standards listed within Section VII.3.20. of the Unified Development Code (UDC), require a special use permit (SUP) for automotive repair and carwashes in the Local Commercial (LC) district. In 2019, an SUP for Kwik Kar was approved for minor automotive repair and car wash. On January 6, 2025, the original SUP was terminated, and a new SUP was granted for a Quick Quack car wash, without vehicle repair services. The initial SUP was rescinded due to failure to install the required landscaping approved with the ordinance. Quick Quack planned to redevelop the site, but has suspended this project indefinitely. The current applicant is looking to get a new SUP allowing both minor automotive repair and a carwash.

ANALYSIS:

Site

The site features an existing tunnel style self-serve car wash and an automotive service building with two service bays. The two existing buildings are connected by a metal canopy. The applicant is not proposing any changes to the existing building façades or parking but is proposing to update the landscaping to conform with the previously approved plans.

Landscaping

Additional landscape improvements are proposed for the interior of the site including the addition of 3 new shade trees. Due to the location of existing water line easement that runs along the southern property line and adjacent to West Round Grove Road, installation of new trees in the existing landscape strip is not encouraged. There is a row of existing Dwarf Buford Holly shrubs along Round Grove Road. Some of these shrubs are missing and the applicant is proposing to plant additional shrubs to fill in any gaps. The additional landscaping will comply with the landscape plan that was previously approved with the SUP in 2019.

Compatibility Criteria for Approval

Article III, Chapter 9, Section 2 of the UDC lists the criteria for approval for Special Use Permits. Staff's analysis for each criterion is outlined below:

A. Compatibility with surrounding uses and community facilities.

The surrounding uses and facilities are commercial, and the proposed use is consistent and compatible. The existing buildings were developed for the use of a carwash and minor vehicle repair.

B. Compatibility with the comprehensive plan and any adopted long-range plans addressing the area.

The Lewisville 2025 Vision Plan designates this area as diverse and thriving neighborhoods. Though the plan calls for urban mixed-use residential development, the site is located on the edge of the employment center designation and is improving the site while maintaining the current use.

C. Enhancement or promotion of the welfare of the area.

The proposed SUP will improve this location while adding additional tree coverage, enhancing the economic and environmental welfare of the area.

D. Whether the use will be detrimental to public health, safety, or general welfare; and

As the site was developed for the intended minor vehicle repair and car wash, staff does not see any negative impacts to public health, safety, or general welfare.

E. Conformity with all zoning regulations and standards.

This is an existing site, and no changes are proposed besides the updated landscaping. The design standards are primarily being met by providing an enhanced site.

CITY STAFF'S RECOMMENDATION:

That the Planning & Zoning Commission recommend approval of the requested special use permit as set forth in the caption above.

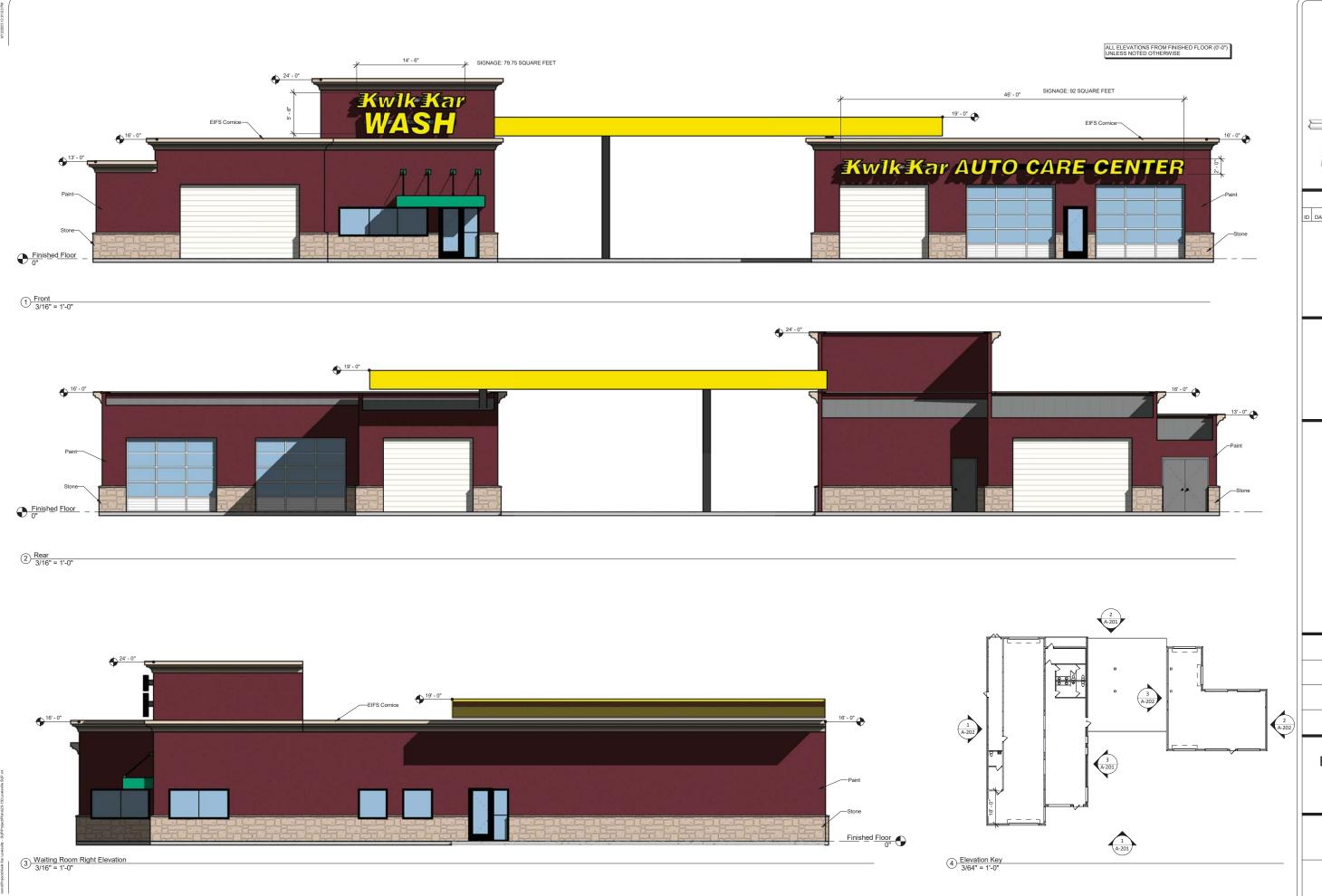

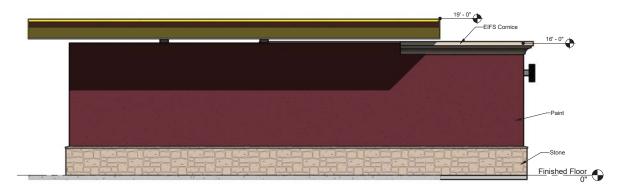

(Case No. 25-03-4-SUP).

BACKGROUND:

The site, located on the 1000 block of East Main Street, was illegally being used for material storage without the approval of a special use permit (SUP) or engineering site plan. Lewisville code enforcement issued a citation to the property for unsightly matter and nonconforming use of outside storage in January 2025. The owner was given a 30-day notice to submit an SUP or cease the use after attending a Development Review Committee meeting on February 12, 2025. The application for the SUP for a contractor's yard was submitted on March 21, 2025.

ANALYSIS:

Two new buildings will be added to the site: an office building and a service building. Two driveways will be added off of East Main Street. They are connected by a U-shaped drive aisle that goes around the two buildings. The developer will also improve a portion of East Main Street by increasing the width of the right-of-way adjacent to the property. Paved parking will be added behind the landscape strip along East Main Street. Another landscape strip will be added on the portion of the property adjacent to Valley Ridge Parkway. The property will be screened by a 6-foot-tall screening wall where the contractor's yard is visible from the right-of-way.

The following are the criteria for consideration of an SUP per Section III.9.2 of the Unified Development Code.

- A. Compatibility with surrounding uses and community facilities; The property is surrounded by properties with both heavy and light industrial uses.
- B. Compatibility with the comprehensive plan and any adopted long-range plans addressing the area:

This project aligns with the Big Move of Economic Vitality outlined in the Lewisville 2025 Vision Plan by improving the quality of business space in Lewisville.

- C. Enhancement or promotion of the welfare of the area; The current property was in violation of the city code. The proposed development with the SUP approval brings this property up to code.
- D. Whether the use will be detrimental to the public health, safety, or general welfare; and There is no expected detrimental effects to the public health, safety, or general welfare of the area related to the development
- E. Conformity with all zoning regulations and standards.

 The property meets all zoning standards required by the zoning district.

CITY STAFF'S RECOMMENDATION:

That the Planning and Zoning Commission recommend approval of the special use permit as set forth in the caption above.

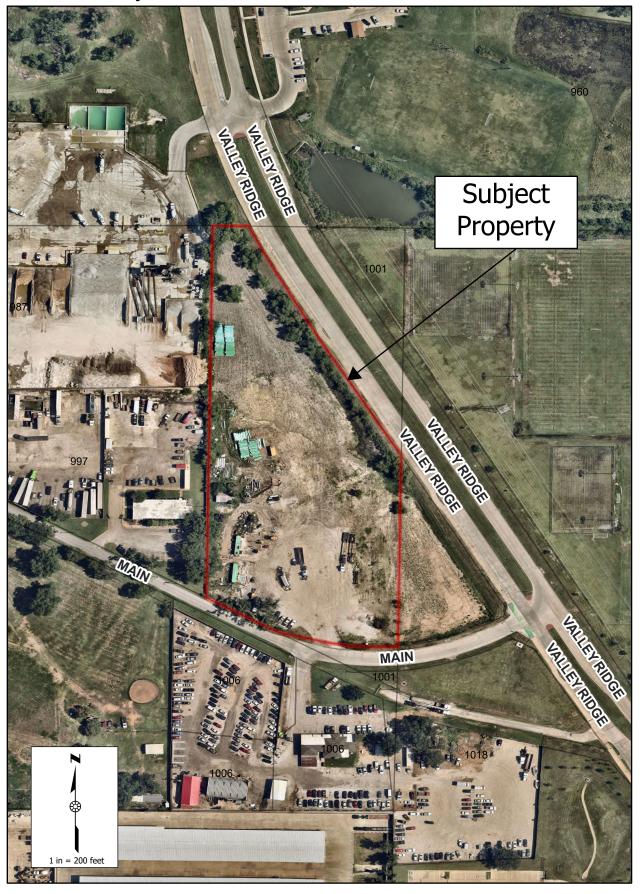

Project Narrative

Project Overview

KIK Underground is seeking to construct a contractor's yard at the northwest corner of E. Main Street and Valley Ridge Boulevard. The proposed development will consist of an office building, repair shop, and an outdoor storage area for the temporary storage of materials and construction equipment. KIK Underground currently uses a facility on Hillside Drive for the office and repair shop. The property is currently zoned Heavy Industrial and no rezoning is proposed. The proposed use is listing as a permitted use with a SUP in the existing zoning district.

A special use permit provides a means for evaluating certain land uses to ensure compatibility with adjacent properties. The special use permit process allows consideration of certain uses that may be incompatible or be overly dominant in the area in which they are located, but these characteristics may be addressed through the provisions of additional restrictions and conditions.

Variances

No variances are proposed at this time.

Purpose

As Valley Ridge Boulevard is fully constructed, no improvements are expected to Valley Ridge Boulevard. E. Main Street will be improved along the frontage of the property to match the existing improved section and will include a sidewalk. Two (2) driveways will be connected to E. Main Street.

The waterline in E. Main Street will be connected to for fire protection and domestic water service. Currently a septic sewer system is planned to provide sewer service.

A detention pond is planned to accommodate an expected increase in the stormwater runoff rate and water quality in accordance with the iSWM Manual.

Compatibility with Lewisville 2025 Plan

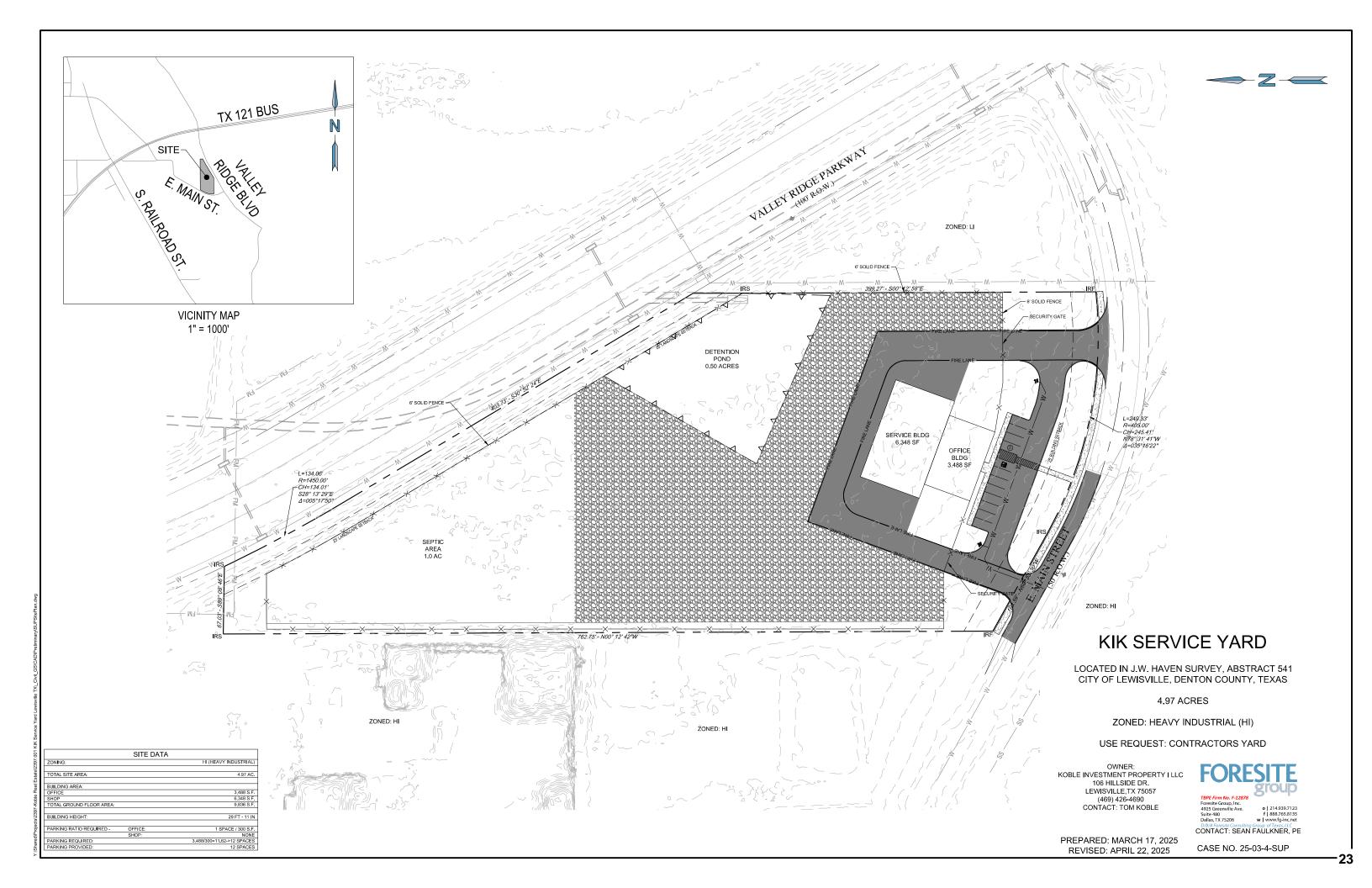
The property is compatible with the Lewisville 2025 Plan.

Compatibility with Business 121 Corridor Plan

The site of the proposed contractor's yard is located in the area designated "Industrial Legacy Center." This area is described as "long-standing industrial and auto-related uses that have been established on the corridor." The proposed use falls under the category of industrial and is compatible with uses on adjacent properties.

Compatibility with Adjacent Properties

The properties to the south and west are zoned HI and is used for a tow yard and a concrete plant respectively. The property to the east across Valley Ridge Parkway is zoned LI and is a private soccer facility. The property to the immediate east is zoned LI and is currently vacant.

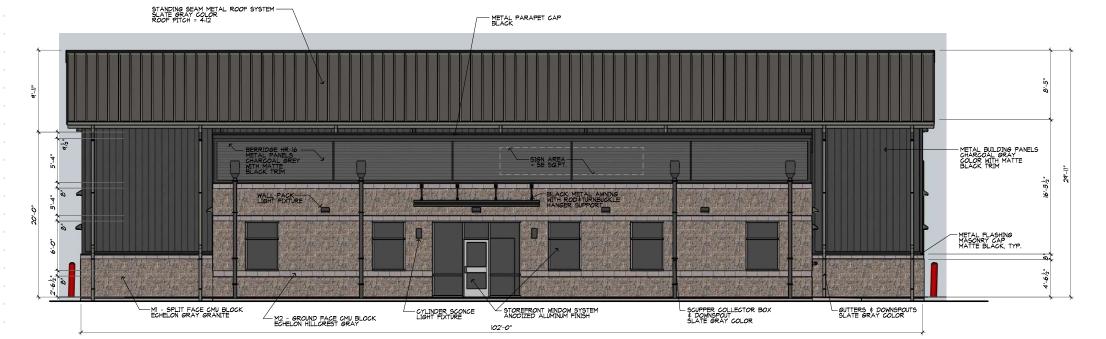

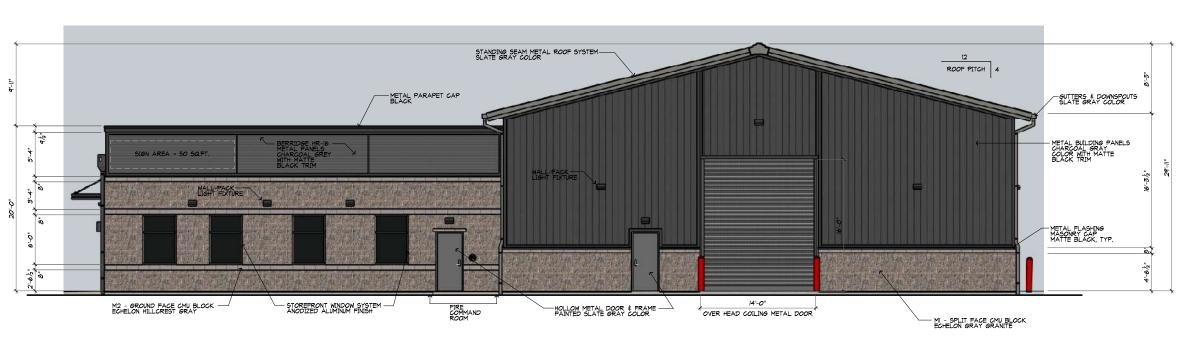

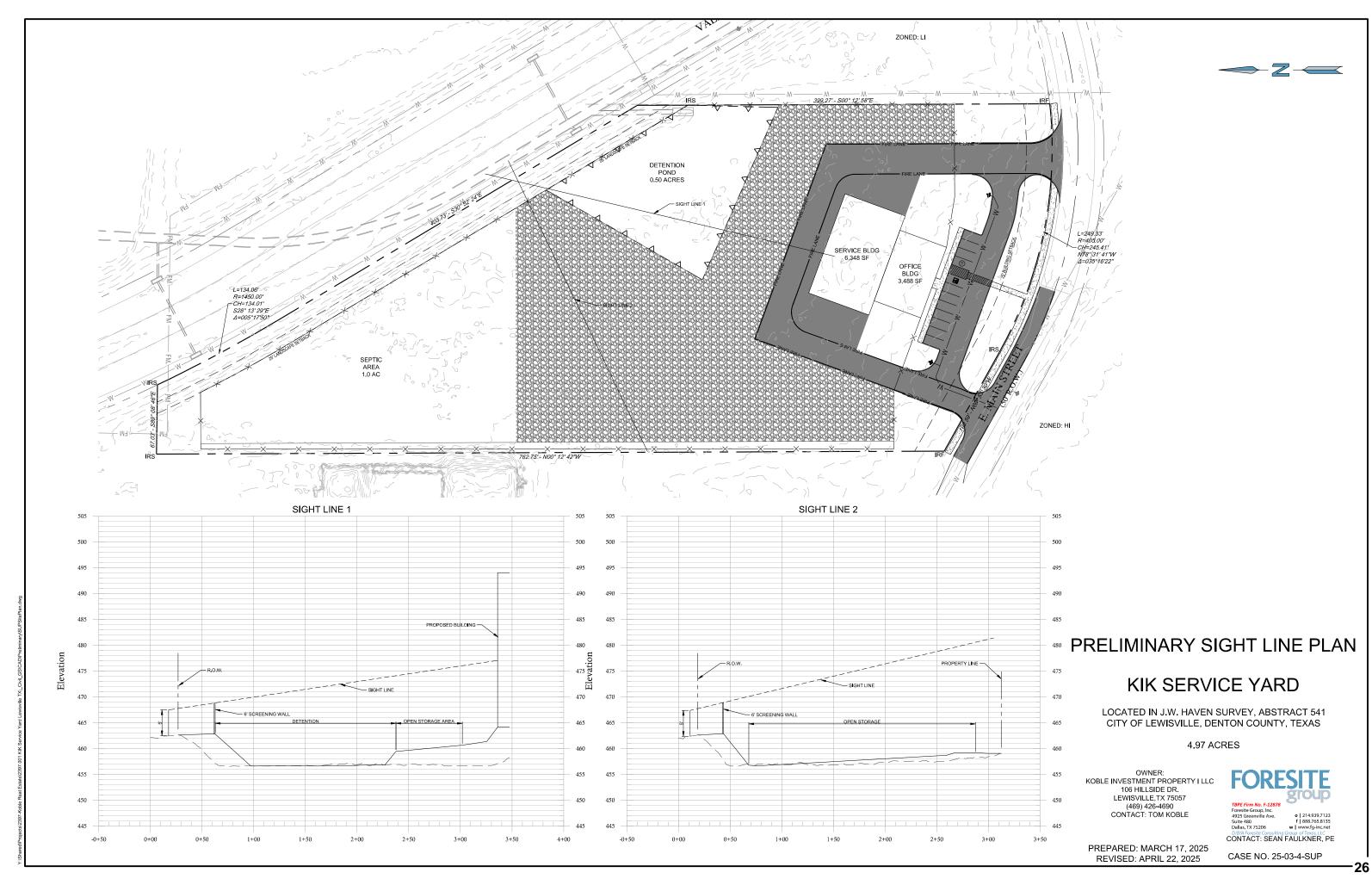

BACKGROUND:

The subject property contains an existing office plaza located at 751 Hebron Parkway. The applicant is proposing to rezone this lot from General Business (GB) to Medical (MD) to allow for the leasing of the suites to medical offices and uses.

ANALYSIS:

The lot is adjacent to other properties that are currently zoned GB. To the north is a 4.71-acre vacant lot, zoned GB. The east side of the property is adjacent to a lake that has shared access from the Cresent Cove at Lakepointe and Lakepointe Residences multi-family developments. The applicant is seeking the rezone to allow for medical office use. MD is considered a less intensive district that allows for fewer uses than the current GB District. If the rezone is approved, some of the uses allowed will be educational, institutional, medical offices, and laboratory uses. The applicant is not proposing any changes to the existing building, parking lot, landscaping or additional site elements.

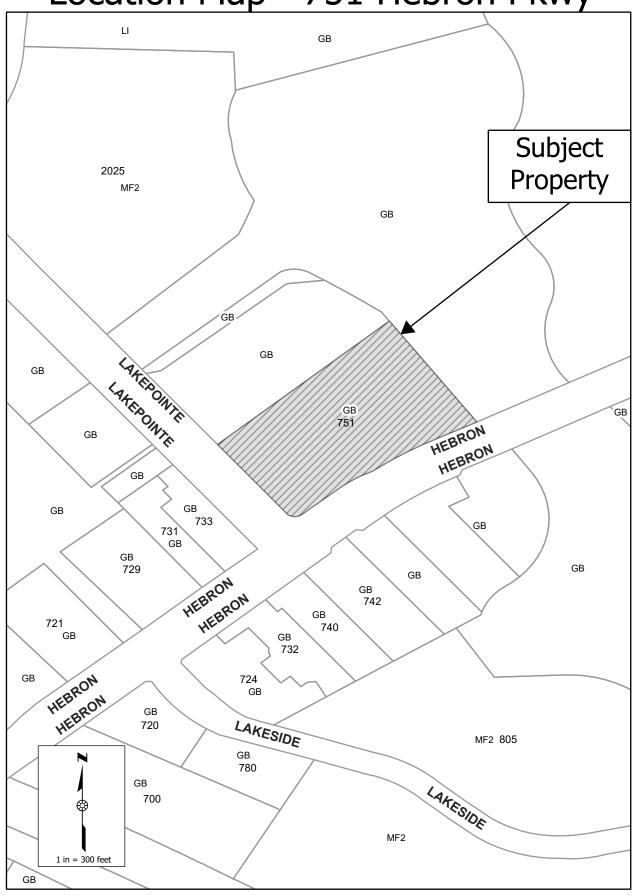

Landscaping Standards Update

<u>Add</u>: Property owners in Lewisville must replace dead or damaged required landscaping with materials listed on the city's <u>current</u> shrub, understory and shade tree list, and maintain to the quantities and locations of the original landscape plan at a minimum.

Rationale:

- Current ordinance can result in landscape plans that use non-native or less sustainable species
- Ensure that replacement material aligns with the city's current tree and shrub list
- Give flexibility to property owners when updating their landscape plan

Proposed changes include:

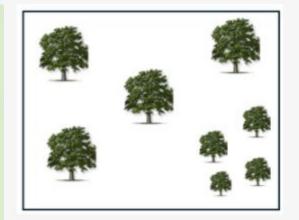
- Reducing the minimum survey size for inclusion in tree preservation plans from 8" to 6" DBH
- Removing two inches of tree credit for protected post oaks and blackjack oaks.

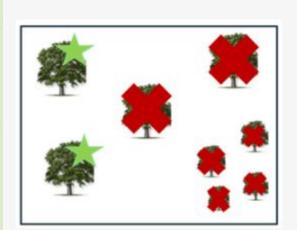
Rationale:

- Healthy Infrastructure Plan's Tree Study showed more than 60% of Lewisville's canopy consists of trees under 6".
- For Post Oaks or Blackjack Oaks, the current credits incentivize removal of protected trees.

Prior Action: City Council approved a tree mitigation fee increase from \$150 to \$200 per Caliper Inch in FY26 Budget

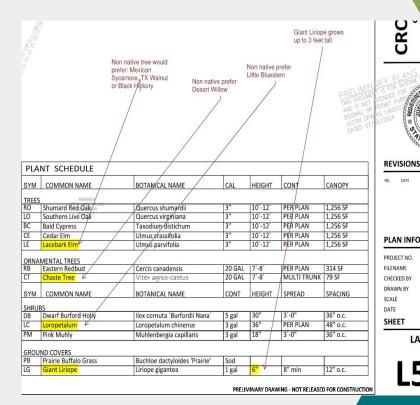
