1. Public Hearing: Consideration of an Ordinance Amending Article III, Chapter 6 "Zoning Petitions And Procedures" of Volume II of the Lewisville City Code, Known as the Unified Development Code, by Amending Section III.6.6 to Remove Limitations on Resubmission of Zoning Petitions Following City Council Denial.

ADMINISTRATIVE COMMENTS:

The Unified Development Code prohibits the resubmission of a zoning petition for one year after a City Council vote to deny the request. The proposed amendment would remove that prohibition to allow any applicant the ability to resubmit a new application at any time. The Planning and Zoning Commission recommended unanimous approval (5-0) on December 17, 2024.

That the City Council approve the ordinance as set forth in the caption above.

Public Hearing: Consideration of an Ordinance Repealing Ordinance No. 0129-19-SUP and Rescinding and Terminating the Special Use Permit Granted Therein Allowing Minor Automobile Services Including Tune-up and Repair Services and a Car Wash Facility on Approximately 1.22 Acres, Legally Described as Lot 3, Block A, The Corners at Valley Parkway Addition; Located at 1111 West Round Grove Road (FM 3040), Zoned Local Commercial (LC).

ADMINISTRATIVE COMMENTS:

On July 15, 2019, the City Council approved a special use permit (SUP) to allow minor automobile services including tune-up and repair services and a car wash facility on the subject property. The City Council has the authority to rescind and terminate the SUP following a public hearing in the event that the abandonment of the structure, lease space, lot or tract of land for 180 days occurs or if one or more of the conditions imposed by the SUP have not been met. The subject property violates two of the conditions: the approved landscape plan and abandonment of the site for 180 days. The Planning and Zoning Commission recommended unanimous approval (5-0) on December 17, 2024.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the City Council approve the ordinance as set forth in the caption above.

Public Hearing: Consideration of an Ordinance Granting a Special Use Permit for a Car Wash; on a 1.22-Acre Lot, Legally Described as Lot 3, Block A, The Corners at Valley Parkway Addition; Located at 1111 West Round Grove Road, Zoned Local Commercial (LC); as Requested by Hailey Peterson, Lonestar Builders, on Behalf of ROYSS, LLC, the Property Owner. (24-02-2-SUP)

ADMINISTRATIVE COMMENTS:

The proposed project will remodel a former KwikKar car wash and vehicle repair facility to a new Quick Quack car wash. A special use permit is required since another automotive related use operates within 1,000 feet. The new carwash will provide additional landscape, use less water and provide higher water reclamation than the previous carwash. The Planning and Zoning Commission recommended unanimous approval (7-0) on November 5, 2024.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the City Council approve the ordinance as set forth in the caption above.

4. Public Hearing: Consideration of an Ordinance Granting a Zone Change From Light Industrial District (LI) to Heavy Industrial District (HI) and Heavy Industrial District (HI) to Light Industrial District (LI), on 8.504 Acres, Legally Described as a Portion of Lot 1, Block A, M.A. Block Addition; Located at 1201 South Railroad Street; as Requested by Arturo Flores, the Applicant, on Behalf of Fluor Enterprises Inc., the Property Owner. (24-09-10-Z).

ADMINISTRATIVE COMMENTS:

Currently, the northern portion of the property is zoned Light Industrial District (LI), and the southern portion is zoned Heavy Industrial District (HI). The applicant proposes rezoning the western portion of the property where the existing office building sits as LI, while rezoning the eastern portion of the property behind the building as HI. The property is surrounded by other industrial uses. The Planning and Zoning Commission recommended unanimous approval (7-0) on December 3, 2024.

That the City Council approve the ordinance as set forth in the caption above.

Public Hearing: Consideration of an Ordinance Granting a Special Use Permit for an Accessory Building/Accessory Structure on 0.0578 Acres Legally Described as Lot 44, Block A, Rockbrook Place, Located at 434 Hamilton Street, Zoned Townhouse Two Residential District (TH-2); as Requested by Zantana Tapia, the Applicant, on Behalf of Iresha Lewis the Property Owner. (Case No. 24-11-19-SUP).

ADMINISTRATIVE COMMENTS:

The property owner is wishing to add a detached patio cover to the backyard of her townhome. The patio cover does not meet the Unified Development Code Supplemental Use Regulations for accessory buildings/accessory structures and requires approval of a special use permit. Patio covers are common additions in the neighborhood. Staff finds this use to be compatible with the surrounding area. The Planning and Zoning Commission recommended unanimous approval (5-0) on December 17, 2024.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the City Council approve the ordinance as set forth in the caption above.

- 6. APPROVAL OF MINUTES: City Council Minutes of the December 9, 2024, Special City Council Meeting, and City Council Minutes of the December 16, 2024, Workshop Session, and Regular Session.
- 7. Approval of a Professional Services Agreement with Birkhoff, Hendricks and Carter L.L.P. in the Amount of \$81,217.50 for Design Services

 Related to the East Main Street at Railroad Sanitary Sewer Replacement and Authorization for the City Manager, or Her Designee, to Execute the Agreement.

ADMINISTRATIVE COMMENTS:

The subject sanitary sewer replacement and upsizing was previously designed and funded but, was never constructed due to unfavorable soil conditions and utility conflicts encountered prior to construction. With the recent multi-family development in Old Town, the need for the upsized sewer underneath the DART rail has become more critical. Staff has selected Birkhoff, Hendricks and Carter, L.L.P. to prepare an updated design for the subject sewer replacement. City staff has negotiated a Professional Services Agreement with Birkhoff, Hendricks and Carter, L.L.P. in the amount of \$77,300 plus a 5% contingency for a total cost of \$81,217.50 to include field survey, subsurface utility engineering, geotechnical analysis, construction plans preparation, **DART** permitting & coordination, utility coordination, bid support and construction support services. Funding is available in the East Main Street Sewer Crossing capital project.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the City Council approve the agreement and authorize the City Manager, or her designee, to execute the agreement as set forth in the caption above.

8. Approval of an Agreement Between the City of Lewisville and Halff Associates, Inc., for Landscape Architecture and Engineering Design Services for the Vista Ridge Park and Vista Ridge Amphitheater Project in the amount of \$519,500; and Authorization for the City Manager, or Her Designee, to Execute the Agreement.

ADMINISTRATIVE COMMENTS:

The scope of the proposed agreement includes schematic design for Vista Ridge Park and construction design for phase one of the Vista Ridge Amphitheater along Lake Vista Drive in South Lewisville. The agreement also includes hydraulic analysis, construction administration, environmental requests, and bidding services. Halff will require eight (8) months for design and estimates five (5) months for construction oversight of the amphitheater site. Once complete, the City will work to identify a partner to assist with development of the ultimate vision of the amphitheater. The schematic design for the park will be used by the Lewisville Park Alliance for fundraising efforts for the playground included in the project, as well as to determine if construction will need to be achieved in phases. The project will be funded through Bond 2024 proceeds.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the City Council approve the agreement and authorize the City Manager, or her designee, to execute the agreement as set forth in the caption above.

9. Approval of an Interlocal Agreement Between Denton County MHMR
Center and the City of Lewisville for the Provision of Services Through
the Adult and Youth Counseling Program; and Authorization for the City
Manager, or Her Designee, to Execute the Agreement.

ADMINISTRATIVE COMMENTS:

On an annual basis, the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Advisory Committee reviews applications from non-profit organizations seeking Social Service funding from the city of Lewisville. The Committee reviews and scores applications then recommend allocations of CDBG and Lewisville Social

Service Agency Funding to the City Council. The Committee reviewed and scored all non-profit applications that were submitted in March 2024. The Committee then recommended awards and allocations that were presented to Council on August 5, 2024, for approval as part of the Annual Action Plan. Denton County MHMR was awarded \$15,000 in City Funds. Denton County MHMR is a governmental entity, and it was determined that an Interlocal Agreement would be utilized to fund the services through the Adult and Youth Counseling Program.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the City Council approve the agreement and authorize the City Manager, or her designee, to execute the agreement as set forth in the caption above.

10. Approval of an Interlocal Cooperation Agreement with Denton County
Texas Related to Funding of Design, Right-of-Way, and Construction for
McKenzie-Hembry Neighborhood Rehabilitation Phase 2; and
Authorization for the Mayor to Execute the Agreement.

ADMINISTRATIVE COMMENTS:

The McKenzie-Hembry Phase 2 neighborhood rehabilitation project includes reconstruction of select streets, utilities, and drainage in the Mckenzie-Hembry Neighborhood. The design will include sidewalks and concrete streets. Funding for design and construction of the McKenzie-Hembry Phase 2 neighborhood rehabilitation project totaling \$5,200,000 was included in the Denton County TRIP-22 bond program to cover roughly 70% of the project cost. The City included \$2,067,180 in the City's 2024 Bond Program to cover the City's portion of the project funding. To date, Denton County has sold \$1,000,000 in debt for the project with the remaining debt being sold in a future bond sale. The City sold \$2,067,180 in debt for the subject project in 2024. The available funding is sufficient to perform design and begin the right-of-way acquisition for the McKenzie-Hembry Phase 2 project. The subject agreement defines Denton County and City of Lewisville responsibilities regarding design, construction, and funding of the McKenzie-Hembry Phase 2 neighborhood rehabilitation project.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the City Council approve the agreement as set forth in the caption above and authorize the Mayor to execute the agreement.

Approval of the Fiscal Year 2024-2025 Fire Protection and Emergency Ambulance Services Interlocal Cooperation Agreement Between Denton County and the City of Lewisville; and Authorization for the City Manager, or Her Designee, to Execute the Agreement.

ADMINISTRATIVE COMMENTS:

The Lewisville Fire Department provides fire protection and emergency ambulance services to Denton County through an interlocal cooperation agreement. By providing fire protection and emergency ambulance services to designated unincorporated areas of Denton County, revenue is generated for the City in the amount of \$78,103. The term of this agreement is for the period of October 1, 2024, through September 30, 2025.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the City Council approve the agreement and authorize the City Manager, or her designee, to execute the agreement as set forth in the caption above.

The applicant is requesting an alternative standard to exterior building material requirements associated with the redevelopment of an old movie theater site into two distribution warehouse facilities. The Planning and Zoning Commission recommended unanimous approval (4-0) on December 17, 2024.
