The subject property contains six platted lots as part of the Greenvalley Addition 1 which are zoned Multi-Family Two (MF2) but were never developed as townhomes. Kathy Lane currently consists primarily of rear entry townhomes with detached garages adjacent to an alley built under these standards. Since the 1974 plat, the MF2 Zoning Districts were amended and townhomes are no longer permitted in MF2 zoning. The applicant desires to build six townhomes that are compatible with the scale and setbacks of the existing townhomes in the neighborhood. The applicant is requesting a variance to allow a reduction from three off-street spaces to two off-street spaces. The Planning and Zoning Commission recommended unanimous approval (5-0) on June 18, 2019.

The City staff's recommendation was that the City Council approve the ordinance and associated variance as set forth in the caption above.

The subject property is located within Castle Hills in the City of Lewisville Extra Territorial Jurisdiction (ETJ) and is to be developed in accordance with the 1996 Castle Hills Agreement. The original phase, Discovery at the Realm Phase I, was constructed in 2017, as a multifamily development with 423 units. The second phase is now under construction and will be adding an additional 312 units. The developments are south of Windhaven Parkway, and east of Castle Hills Drive. The driveway in question is between the phases and will act as the main entrance for Phase II and a secondary entrance to Phase I. The developer is proposing to increase the width of the existing 26-foot wide driveway to 42 feet.

Deputy Mayor Pro Tem Ferguson advised that he would prefer to have the City's name on the MCL Grand. Deputy Mayor Pro Tem Troyer advised he was in agreement with Deputy Mayor Pro Tem Ferguson. Councilmember Jones advised he would prefer to just have City of Lewisville on everything and brand everything after the City.

The consensus of the City Council was they were in favor of staff's recommendation as follows:

- Arts Center do not seek a new naming rights sponsor for the facility, but pursue sponsor opportunities for individual spaces and for presenting series
- Railroad Park attempt to reach a renewal agreement with Lone Star Toyota of Lewisville; if unsuccessful, pursue sponsor opportunities for individual spaces or equipment packages
- Thrive do not seek a naming rights sponsor for the facility, but pursue sponsor opportunities for individual spaces and for equipment/program packages

City Manager Barron advised that staff would put together sales packages and a signage package.

Mayor Durham adjourned the workshop session of the Lewisville City Council into Closed Session at 8:32 p.m. Monday, July 15, 2019, in accordance with the requirements of the Open Meetings Law.

FACILITY NAMING RIGHTS - HISTORY

- City reached an agreement with CSL Marketing Group in August 2009 to identify naming rights opportunities, establish potential value, and seek naming rights partners
- Agreement focused on Railroad Sports Park, Performing Arts Civic Center, and Western Day
- Contract cost was \$17,500 for valuation and planning, monthly consulting fee of \$5,500, and a commission of 15.5 percent up to 20 percent
- CSL helped the city secure naming rights for Railroad Park and the Performing Arts Civic Center but was not interested in marketing smaller venues

FACILITY NAMING RIGHTS - HISTORY

- City staff used the CSL methodology to assess and document naming rights value for Old Town Park Plaza and for individual spaces inside the arts center
- First Choice Power signed a three-year deal for naming rights
 to the arts center box office and concession stand, valued at
 \$10,000 per year; that agreement ended when the company
 was acquired and ceased to exist
- Staff made proposals to other companies for the arts center and the plaza, with no agreements reached
- City Council later voted to name the plaza after former mayor Wayne Ferguson in lieu of sponsorship

- Sponsorship valuations for a facility are based primarily on exposure through impressions (how many people will see the sponsor name or emblem as a result of the sponsorship) and advertising value
- Intangible benefits such as prestige, recognition, activation, and community support can be a factor, especially for potential sponsors with strong ties to the local community or to the focus of the facility (e.g. arts, health, animal welfare, etc.)
- Example on the following slides is taken from a 2013 valuation for Old Town Park Plaza:

- Projected attendance is the first measure of impressions
- Direct visitation counts people who are expected to visit the facility being considered for naming
- Indirect visitation counts people who will drive past the facility or visit adjacent sites
- Historic trends are important, but a new facility can only use projected attendance figures

- Partner ID Valuation is based on advertising placement (paid and unpaid) away from the facility
- It includes advertising for the facility that will include the name of the sponsor
- It also includes advertising for events held at the facility that will include the name or logo of the facility
- Sponsorship is typically viewed as a replacement for paid advertising

- Other measures included in the valuation are traffic counts, cost to purchase equivalent advertising, and website traffic
- Note that social media traffic was not a valuation consideration in 2013; it would be a significant contributor today
- Essentially, any placement of the sponsor name or emblem can add value to the facility naming rights

On-Site Signage - traffic counts

Current directional signage includes fixed locations on Main Street eastbound (between Milton and Charles), and on Church Street westbound (between Kealy and Mill). Average daily traffic counts:

Main Street eastbound at Milton 11,655/day (peak 12,455)
Church Street westbound Kealy 11,750/day (peak 12,280)
Total for Old Town wayfinding signs 23,405/day

Off-Site Signage - digital billboards

By contract, the city receives one slot out of seven on two digital billboards managed by Clear Channel. A city message appears on each billboard at least once per minute for eight seconds. Spots are used to market city events, including events that would be held at Old Town Plaza. Four additional two-sided signs have been approved by City Council and will begin operating before the Plaza opens. Valuation reflects rental fees for one month (of the city's 12 months) at each location.

- All valuations are then combined into a single figure for tangible sponsor benefit
- Sponsors expect an ROI on their investment that exceeds the value (here, a factor of 2.5 is used)
- Intangible benefits can help sell a lower ROI factor to the right sponsor

Rights Fee

The table below shows the calculated value of tangible benefits associated with a Naming Rights partnership for Old Town Plaza. In order to capitalize on that value, a 2.5 cost/benefit ratio is used to determine the approximate Rights Fee that would be associated with this project. This means a Naming Rights partner would receive approximately \$2.50 in measured tangible benefits for every \$1.00 spent. It does not, of course, take into account the Non-Tangible Benefits described elsewhere.

- Of the \$750,000 contract value, the city spent \$64,300 for initial signage and \$132,300 in commission to CSL Marketing
- Net to the city through the 10-year term is \$554,300
- Sponsorship money is used to pay expenses of presenting series at MCL Grand (Texas Tunes and Black Box Songwriter concert series)



Medical City Lewisville GRAND THEATER

- Medical City Lewisville receives 6 free tickets to all citypresented shows in the Performance Hall (e.g. Texas Tunes) and can request tickets for city-presented shows in other spaces (e.g. Black Box Songwriter concerts)
- Hospital gets up to six days of free facility rentals per year
- The hospital has one member on the Council-appointed Arts Advisory Board, serving in the seat reserved for a "major employer"



Partner: Lone Star Toyota of Lewisville

Original Partner Name: Rene Isip's Toyota of Lewisville

Starting Date: August 16, 2010

Term: Ten years (through September 30, 2020)

Value: \$1,500,000

Payments: \$150,000 per year (paid monthly)

Status: Active, renewal negotiations under way





- Of the \$1,500,000 contract value, the city spent \$153,457 for initial signage and \$180,043 in commission to CSL Marketing
- Net to the city through the 10-year term is \$1,166,500
- Sponsorship money has been used for shade structures, a fitness station, the train-themed playground, and some large pieces of maintenance equipment
- Sponsorship money also contributes to Funny Bunny and Spooktacular Trails programming





- Toyota gets on-site presence at city events in the park; this
 has been sporadic because of management and staff
 changes at the dealership
- Toyota also gets use of the park one day per year for a company event
- Toyota has right of first refusal for continuation of the agreement



- Both facilities with naming rights partners have undergone a name change during the 10-year term; both new names were substantially similar to the original names, but this can create a challenge with costs and with customer identification
- Rene Isip's Toyota of Lewisville became Lone Star Toyota of Lewisville in December 2016 and paid for new signage and banners in accordance with the agreement
- Medical Center of Lewisville became Medical City Lewisville in December 2016 but opted not to pay for new signage at and around the facility





- Loss of a naming rights sponsor for the facility would create a revenue challenge (\$65,000 in FY 2019-20)
- Ticket sales in 2018-19 are about 40 percent ahead of budget
- Staff has approached potential partners about naming rights for the MCL Grand Presents concert series, and is optimistic about finding a partner for FY 2019-20
- Staff also is updating the valuation for individual spaces within the center for possible sponsor opportunities



- Staff is negotiating a renewal with Lone Star Toyota of Lewisville and there appears to be interest on both sides, although it might be at a lower value
- If a new agreement is reached with a lower value, that could make some individual areas (e.g. the dog park) eligible for separate naming rights
- If the agreement is not renewed, staff will pursue a new naming rights partner if directed by Council





- Staff is developing an assessment and valuation for naming rights and sponsor opportunities within Thrive
- Multi-year opportunities could include fitness center and walking track (e.g. Medical City Lewisville), senior lounge, teen lounge, indoor play area, and Thrive living room
- One-time opportunities could include public art, equipment, furniture, and scholarships
