Visitors/Citizens Forum

Patrick Kelly, 2511 Sir Turquine Lane, Lewisville, Texas, spoke before the City Council in regard to the Castle Hills Police Patrol. Mr. Kelly thanked the City Council and City of Lewisville for their support thus far in finding a mutually beneficial police solution for Castle Hills. He addressed both positive and negative comments on social media regarding this situation and expressed his belief that the silent majority is in favor of Lewisville police presence in Castle Hills. He addressed the reason they had utilized a private police presence previously, as Lewisville was not able to provide the necessary/required service. He encouraged a discussion to be held if the City did not feel they would be able to fill eight hours a day presence. Mr. Kelly also addressed his concerns that the patrol hour times be left off of any official documentation, but to list those times as deemed appropriate by Castle Hills and Lewisville, in an effort to not create issues of anyone thinking there were no police present in the area.



DEFINITION OF SHELTERED

Section 1: How do we define Emergency Shelter in Denton County?

- Unsheltered: people sleeping in places not meant for human habitation such as a car, tent, bench, or other public place
- Standards for adequate *Emergency* Shelter:
 - Must be considered habitable
 - Is considered a short-term solution
 - Services and case management should be housing-focused
 - Shelter access should be low-barrier and have few conditions for entry



CURRENT EMERGENCY SHELTER INVENTORY

Section 2: What is the current emergency shelter inventory in Denton County? What is our current homeless population, and are there gaps, in available shelter services?

- On average, beds are available for the days shelters are operating
 - MKOC Open MTW and inclement weather; max. capacity of 92 beds
 - TSA Open 7 days/week; max. capacity of 30 beds (increased to 42 during inclement weather)
- MKOC reported one night where individuals were turned away



FUTURE PLANS

Section 3: What are the future plans of Denton County organizations to increase access to emergency shelter or temporary housing solutions?

- Received presentations from organizations with plans to expand shelter or transitional housing capacity
- 4 presentations provided by:
 - Crossroads of Hope
 - Grace Like Rain Ministries
 - Denton Basic Services Center
 - Serve Denton, Phase 5
- Note, The Salvation Army (TSA) has plans to expand their shelter capacity in Denton in the future, but are legally restricted from sharing details currently

SURVEY OF SHELTER SERVICES

Section 4: What does Denton County's homeless population have to say about the accessibility and quality of shelter services?

Key Demographics

92 individuals surveyed

- **68%** Sheltered, 32% Unsheltered
- **51%** Female, Male 49%
- **55%** White, 18% African American, 17% Hispanic/Latino
- **14%** are Veterans
- Half reported some source of income
 (18% disability income, 15% FT job, 9% PT job, 11% other source)

Information on Inclement Weather

55% of respondents reported getting information about emergency shelter services during inclement weather through their cell phones

During the rainy days in recent months, what did you do?

- 44% reported being able to go to shelter
- **18%** reported barriers (transportation, not knowing if shelter would be open, and perception of not enough space)
- **38%** reported Other mostly places not habitable, a few in hotel (2) or with friend/family (7)

Shelter Accessibility

- **28%** reported difficult to find or organize transportation to the shelter
- 24% reported lack of beds (perceived)
- **21%** reported incompatible shelter hours
- 20% reported process of bed assignment

Top Reported for "Fear or Hesitancy to Access Shelter"

- Lack of Privacy (42%)
- Concern about getting sick (40%)
- Fear of belongings being stolen (38%)
- Preference for being surrounded by their own social network (30%)
- Strict shelter rules (28%)
- Short lengths of stay (27%)

Section 5: Is shelter accessible during inclement weather?

 - Set common parameters for inclement weather
 - Established communications
- Posted on the Denton County Homeless
 Coalition's site and on the city websites

City of Lewisville Warming Centers & Emergency Shelter

Definitions

- Public Facility: Any facility, whether City-owned/operated or place of business, open and accessible to the public for warm refuge.
- Warming Center: Any facility specially designated and advertised as such, being a
 place for warm refuge from winter weather with heating, access to restrooms, winter
 weather safety and educational material, trained facility staff, and/or access to social
 services. Warming centers are typically operated during "business hours", but
 sometimes operate during "extended business hours" (open a few hours later than
 normal), should the situation dictate.
- Emergency Shelter: A facility, typically with large open spaces such as a cafeteria/feeding area or gym that can be set-up and staffed temporarily to provide emergency accommodations to protect public safety and operated for overnight stay(s).

Lists of Facilities

(lists not all-inclusive, nor exact; must maintain flexibility to meet specific need)

Persons needing temporary relief from winter weather conditions can be encouraged to visit public facilities during operating hours such as the mall, movie theater, local restaurant, etc. If this does not provide adequate relief, contact with a social service agency for case management and needs assistance, may be required. These facilities may be recommended as places of warm refuge during business hours only.


CERT Program

- OEM will conduct 3 4 free CERT (20-hour) courses per year for Lewisville residents
- Designed to teach disaster preparedness and basic disaster survival skills to help themselves, their family, and their neighbors during the initial post-disaster period



NERP Program

- OEM will conduct 10 free NERP workshops per year and assist neighborhoods in developing a plan of action before a disaster strikes
- Neighbors can assist each other for at least 72 hours after a disaster strikes or until help arrives

CERT Training

- 20-hours classroom/skills training
- Skills: Disaster first aid and triage, search and rescue, cribbing, shutting off utilities, extinguishing small fires, incident command, and disaster psychology
- ► Ages 18+ (except for Teen CERT)
- Physical strength is not a requirement as there are many other tasks that do not require lifting
- CERT members may self-deploy to help their neighbors and coordinate with OEM after a disaster
- Opportunities for additional trainings (Stop-the-Bleed, Shelter, CERT Instructor)
- Can assist with special events, crowd control for parades, and shelter operations
- CERT members will be encouraged to develop a NERP for their neighborhood
